Since 2017, CME has evolved from a small division offering just a handful of programs to a dynamic provincial leader in continuing professional development, now delivering nearly fifty high-quality educational offerings annually and engaging thousands of learners across Saskatchewan and beyond.

Our success rests not only in numbers, but in the meaningful relationships we have cultivated. CME continues to expand its network of collaborators—thought partners within and beyond our College, across disciplines, professions, and geographies—each committed to the shared goal of improving patient care through learning. This past year, our division continued to broaden access and participation through new asynchronous learning options and innovative hybrid formats that reach learners in rural, northern, and Indigenous communities. Thirty percent of our programs are now developed interprofessionally with colleagues from across the health sciences, reflecting our belief that high-quality care is the product of teamwork, inclusion, and shared learning. CME has also continued to build national relationships with partner institutions such as UBC, Western, and Manitoba—collaborations that position Saskatchewan as a leader in accreditation standards and educational quality assurance.

We are also increasingly intentional in how we demonstrate our academic value. CME's research and scholarship portfolio has matured into an integral part of the College's research enterprise, contributing peer-reviewed publications, national conference presentations, and multi-institutional studies that align with our identity as part of Canada's U15 research university group. ### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The **Division of Continuing Medical Education (CME)** at the University of Saskatchewan continues to lead transformative professional learning for healthcare providers across Saskatchewan and beyond. In 2024–25, CME delivered **over 47 programs**, reaching **4,678 participants**, and expanding its team to **37 members**, reflecting sustained growth and commitment to excellence.

### **Key Achievements**

- **Accreditation & Collaboration:** CME partnered with institutions like UBC, UManitoba, and Western for accreditation audits and process sharing, reinforcing national leadership in CME quality assurance.
- **Award-Winning Programs:** CanREACH-SK PPP Mini-Fellowship and SIPPA continued to receive recognition for their impact on mental health care and rural physician integration.
- **Expanded Learning Access:** CME increased asynchronous offerings from 2 to 20 since 2018, supporting flexible, self-paced learning for diverse professionals.
- **Interprofessional Engagement:** 30% of programs were developed collaboratively with health sciences colleagues, enhancing teambased care education.








### **Post COVID-19 Condition**

### **SIPPA**



Since its launch in 2011, the Saskatchewan International Physician Practice Assessment (SIPPA) program has supported 587 internationally trained physicians in successfully completing its Practice Ready Assessment component (as of April 30, 2025). In 2023, SIPPA expanded its mandate to include oversight of all post-assessment Supervision for IMG family physicians, with a focus on enhancing physician well-being, quality of care, and retention. In January 2025, the first cohort completed SIPPA's two-year Supervision program with an impressive 92% success rate on the CFPC certification examination.









A strong organizational plan is required to support the achievement of the CME's purpose and allow for achievement of measurable goals within the strategic plan.





### **Contracted Engagements & Other Funding Sources**






