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Allen Finley, MD, is a pediatric anesthesiologist who has worked for over 30 years in pain research and management. He is Professor of Anesthesia, Pain Management, & Perioperative Medicine at Dalhousie University, and is cross appointed as Professor of Psychology & Neuroscience. He also holds the inaugural Dr. Stewart Wenning Chair in Pediatric Pain Management at IWK Health in Halifax and is Director of

the Centre for Pediatric Pain Research. He has published 150 papers in peer-reviewed journals (http://tinyurl.com/gaf-cits) and has lectured widely, with more than 300 invited presentations on six continents.

Chelsea da Estrela, PhD, completed her PhD in Clinical Psychology at Concordia University in Montreal. In addition to maintaining a small private practice in Halifax, Dr. da Estrela is a psychologist on the Pediatric Complex Pain Team, the Hematology/Oncology/Nephrology service, and runs the Consultative-Liaison service at the IWK.





Allison Lerette currently works as one of the physiotherapists on the complex pain team at the IWK. She graduated from Dalhousie university, with the goal of eventually working in pediatrics. After graduation, she worked with many different populations and found that the one thing that many populations have in common when they're seeking out physiotherapy, is pain. Allison works with patients

and their families to help them get back to doing the things they love.

Shelley Lowther has been working at the IWK (NICU, Pain Research, and Pain Service) for 25 years. She became interested in pediatric pain management through her work with infants, supporting the sickest and tiniest babies through multiple procedures. She later completed a master's thesis on how parents can support their child during procedural pain. In 2012, she began



working as a Clinical Nurse Specialist in Pediatric Pain Management and works with both acute and chronic pain patients and their families
